

How Can My Program Join Caregiver's Choice?

STEP 1: Review the Eligibility Requirements

STEP 2: Apply to Join

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Welcome to the Mentoring Children of Prisoner's Voucher Demonstration Program "Caregiver's Choice." Established in 2007, the Voucher Demonstration Program is designed to increase access to mentoring services nationwide and provide caregivers and parents the choice to select a mentoring program that meets high quality standards. The Family and Youth Services Bureau, within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, awarded a grant to the National Mentoring Partnership (MENTOR) to coordinate the distribution of the vouchers. The goal is to serve children who reside in areas not served by a Mentoring Children of Prisoner's basic grant, Native American children and children residing in rural areas. In addition, MENTOR provides ongoing training and technical assistance to all community based Caregiver's Choice Mentoring Providers and their Affiliates.

HOW DOES CAREGIVER'S CHOICE WORK?

In Caregiver's Choice, MENTOR brings mentoring programs and children with incarcerated parents together to establish quality new mentoring relationships.

Mentoring programs that meet quality standards in mentoring and working with families of the incarcerated are eligible to apply. Once approved, mentoring programs are able to accept vouchers from children enrolled in Caregiver's Choice.

At the same time, caregivers or parents of eligible children (from age 4 up to age 18 with a parent in a federal or state prison) can submit an application for their child. They will receive a list of approved mentoring programs in their city or state, and a voucher (or mentoring scholarship) that can be redeemed for mentoring services. Caregivers then select the mentoring program that best fits their needs.

The selected mentoring program is responsible for recruiting, screening, and training a mentor and supporting the mentoring match. Each qualified program can receive up to \$1,000 per match to support a year-long match relationship.

Five Reasons Your Mentoring Program Should Join Caregiver's Choice

- 1 ACCESS FUNDING TO SERVE MORE CHILDREN:** Approved mentoring programs will receive \$1,000 for every Caregiver's Choice mentoring match that lasts at least one year. This financial support helps cover many of the costs associated with starting and sustaining a mentoring match. By joining Caregiver's Choice, your program will help ensure that more children with incarcerated parents benefit from the support mentors provide.
- 2 TAP INTO FEDERAL FUNDS:** Applying for and managing federal grants can be especially demanding, and grant sizes are often too large for smaller programs. Because Caregiver's Choice focuses on an individual child, reporting and tracking is based only on that child's mentoring relationship. This makes federal funding more accessible and manageable for your program.
- 3 MANAGE YOUR PARTICIPATION:** Approved mentoring programs can choose to serve as many or as few Caregiver's Choice mentoring relationships as they want—from one child to dozens. Regardless of how many children your program chooses to serve, the essential requirement is that your program is committed to ensuring high quality and long-lasting mentoring relationships.
- 4 LEVERAGE NATIONAL EFFORTS TO RECRUIT CHILDREN OF PRISONERS:** A common challenge for programs serving children of prisoners is finding and enrolling the children. In Caregiver's Choice, MENTOR's team will be engaging caregivers and incarcerated parents through national networks, prison visits, and caregiver organizations in selected geographic areas. Your program will also have access to Caregiver's Choice recruitment materials if you want to directly engage children of prisoners in your area.
- 5 BENEFIT FROM CUTTING-EDGE TRAINING AND TOOLS:** Approved mentoring programs will receive training from experts on fostering mentoring relationships that meet the unique needs of children of prisoners. Approved programs will also use MentorPRO Basic® to track progress towards milestones and assess the quality and outcomes of Caregiver's Choice matches. These resources will help your program stay at the forefront of mentoring practice.
